Bill Hammond

Arguably one of New Zealand's most respected contemporary painters, William (Bill) Hammond was born in Ōtautahi / Christchurch in 1947. He grew up in the suburb of Bryndwr and attended the University of Canterbury School of Fine Arts from 1966 until 1968. At this time, Bill also became involved in the Christchurch folk music scene and played percussion in one of Aotearoa New Zealand's most celebrated jug bands, The Band of Hope Jug Band. By the early 1970s, he was living and working in Akaroa on Horomaka / Banks Peninsula as a toymaker, before relocating to Ōhinehou / Lyttelton where he continued to design and make toys as well as working in a sign factory and making jewellery.

Bill began to focus on his career as a painter in the early 1980s, and had his first solo exhibition in 1976 at the Brooke Gifford Gallery in Christchurch. In 1989, he joined a number of other New Zealand artists on an expedition to the subantarctic Auckland Islands, a trip that was to have profound effect on his painting. In 1990, he travelled to Tokyo, Japan on a Queen Elizabeth II Arts Council of New Zealand grant. Bill was included in *Distance Looks Our Way: Ten Artists from New Zealand* (1991/92), a group exhibition at the International Expo in Seville, Spain; *Headlands: Thinking Through New Zealand Art* (1992) at the Museum of Contemporary Art, Sydney; the *Biennale of Sydney 2000*; and *Paradise Now? Contemporary Art from the Pacific* at the Asia Society Museum in New York (2004). In 1999, Bill's first survey exhibition, *23 Big Pictures*, was curated and toured by Dunedin Public Art Gallery, followed in 2007 by the major survey exhibition *Jingle Jangle Morning*, curated by Christchurch Art Gallery Te Puna o Waiwhetū.

Bill lost his beloved studio on Canterbury Street, Lyttelton in the earthquakes of 2010/11. Originally the Masonic Kilwinning Lodge, it was here that he completed many of his major paintings. Bill's last public gallery exhibition was *Playing the Drums* at Christchurch Art Gallery Te Puna O Waiwhetū in 2019.

Bill lived and worked for most of his career in Ōhinehou / Lyttelton. He died in January 2021.
